Hollisdale & Pappinbarra Rural Fire Brigades

Hi all, it certainly was a very busy start to the fire season, with El Nino confirmed the predictions were unfavourable so being well prepared was on the agenda, luckily the weather gods were on our side and with the end of the season nearly upon us and the massive amount of undergrowth that has occurred over the years, it's time to start preparing for the next fire season.

The inquiry into 2019/20 bush fires had recommended that changes needed to be made so emergency services had a better chance of controlling out of control fires and make our community safer, one of these recommendations was that

overgrown and washed out fire trails and tracks needed to be cleaned up and maintained. The government has paid out hundreds of millions of dollars all over the state to get this project underway, and it's great to see our area has not missed out, with the help of a local contractor many tracks in Pappinbarra, Mt Boss, Yarras, Bellangry, etc, are being cleaned up which will give emergency services a great opportunity to box the fires in using these tracks as containment lines. Over the next few months you may see fire trucks up and down the valley checking out these tracks so we can use them too our advantage when required, so don't be alarmed.

The following are some details from Pappinbarra resident and RFS member Pete Michael about his fire fighting set up at home:



The tank is our main rainwater collection tank: 130,000L. It has a 65mm Storz fitting and gate valve at the base and the domestic takeoff (blue ball-valve) is set 10,000L above it, allowing for firefighter water to be kept. The pump is a 4-way Davey with a 5.5HP Briggs and

Stratton engine. It has 2 x 1.5" camlock outlets and 2 x 1" Storz. To the side is a toolbox of kit with 4 x 30m 1" percolating lay-flats, 2 x nozzles, a 25/38 Storz adapter and 1.5" M/M camlock adapter. We can 'wrap



around' the property from both sides if needed using $2 \times 60m$ configurations. We also have a portable Orange f/fighter pump and this can be hooked up to our other tanks as well as 1.5" riser with Storz fitting at the bottom of the orchard. We use this if doing pile burns or burning off the bottom paddock.

Thank you Jean Hegarty!

L ate last year Jean Hegarty stepped down from her most recent PPA committee membership, and as the editor of Pitchfork. Acknowledging these milestones, this article celebrates her remarkable contribution to the Pappinbarra community over the last 23 years.

When Jean and George Hegarty moved to Pappinbarra in 1999, one of the guests at a welcome gathering in their honour invited them to attend a PPA meeting. Shortly after, Jean joined the committee and the rest, as they say, is history. With vision, commitment, tenacity and many, many hours of dedicated work she has given generously of her time, skills and energy

she has given generously of her time, skills and energy to the Valley's activities ever since.

One of Jean's early roles was as a community representative on the Hastings Catchment Management Committee. She also played a very active role in the development of the Pappinbarra Community Plan for the Port Macquarie Hastings Council's Community-Council Action Team (CCAT) initiative.

Her standout contributions though have been in grant writing and editorship of Pitchfork. Since 2012, with help from Sue Frost and Lisa McLeod on financials, Jean has successfully applied for 25 grants for the PPA to a total value of around \$400,000! This includes the \$256,000 grant for the new kitchen which she applied for 6 times over about 10 years until successful. Over the years the funds have made an immeasurable contribution to the amenity of our beautiful Hall (remember when it had no heating, no covered outdoor area, no storage shed, no fence, no shade sail, and badly needed painting and a new kitchen?). Funding has also been awarded for a number of the activities hosted at the Hall, and for the Wildlife of the

Pappinbarra Valley display boards recently installed there, the latter a project dear to Jean's heart. On top of all this she has also won two grants for the local RFS totalling \$26,000.

Then there's Pitchfork. In a truly remarkable effort Jean edited Pitchfork for almost a decade, starting when I stepped down as editor in October 2013 and with just two breaks along the way she produced around 100 issues. I know from experience what a huge job this is and the value of that effort to the community is impossible to overstate. This little newsletter is the communication lifeblood of the Valley and has been filled with wonderful stories about the Valley's history, current residents, events, obituaries and wildlife; regular vital information from the RFS and other disaster preparedness and recovery matters; and is the go-to place for Valley happenings. As well as editing, Jean has written a lot of the newsletter content, including the popular Times Past stories (acknowledging Mary Wagg for her input to these).



Jean was President of the PPA for 3 years; along with George, has attended almost every PPA working bee at the Hall since their arrival; has lobbied Council on various matters; and been a longstanding member of Pappinbarra Landholders Conservation Group. She's also been a strong supporter of the Valley's little church and played an active role in the struggle to ensure that it remained in community hands. In keeping with her love of history, she compiled a book about the church for its 80th anniversary, and again for its 90th (copies of the latter are still available).

It's easy to see that 'community' has been - and will surely remain - a huge part of Jean's love for Pappinbarra Valley. Thank you Jean, our community has benefitted enormously from your wonderful energy, dedication and skill.

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3-Day Sickness in Cattle (BEF Bovine Ephemeral Fever)

L ate November we had three 14-month-old heifers reluctant to get up. When they did get up, they would soon go back to lying on the ground. I am sure you would agree a symptom of 3-Day Sickness but too early for the mid-north coast as it is more common around February and March. A disease believed to be carried by mosquitoes and sandflies, it is understandable that it becomes more common in the warmer wetter months.



It is caused by a virus and not uncommon in young cattle, they can be down for 3 days and longer. Whilst most animals will recover if they can access food, water

and shelter, it does seem to affect heavier, healthier individuals like bulls more and be particularly problematic if they cannot get up to access fluids (a little like Man-Flu). It is a particularly good idea to vaccinate bulls. Cattle will develop immunity to 3-Day Sickness if exposed to the virus either through getting the disease or vaccination. Similar to the flu it can be more virulent in some years.

We contacted Ian Poe the Local Land Services (LLS) veterinarian. Ian can provide advise for herd-based health issues (for individual animal issues your local veterinarian should be contacted). Ian took body



temperatures and blood samples of the sick animals for laboratory analysis, checking for 3-Day. The tests came back negative. We still do not know the cause of their temporary lethargy. During late November 2023, there had been cases of 3-Day around Casino but none had been confirmed on the Macleay nor Hastings. We will be watching out for it during February and March especially because of this summer's weather.
