Commercial Kitchen for the Hollisdale Hall?

The Hollisdale Hall, the central meeting point for the Pappinbarra community, has been used for all kinds of different events over the years. In the past people used the kitchen as an extension of their own kitchen to prepare food for community events in the Hall. Sadly this can no longer be the case. All levels of government - local, state and federal - increasingly impose their laws and regulations on the use of community halls, especially when it comes to the preparation of food.

The PPA, on behalf of the community, is very keen to broaden the usage of the Hall. It could be rented out for wedding receptions etc and be used by the Association and other members of the community to put on plays, music events and other celebrations where preparation of food may be a requirement. It could also be used by members of the community who want to value add to their produce,

e.g. make cheeses, jams, pickles etc and sell these at farmers' markets and other retail outlets.

For quite some time now there has been a debate amongst committee members and others about having a commercial kitchen as part of the Hall. The discussion centred round upgrading the existing kitchen but, on the whole, this idea has been discarded because the kitchen is the old original school building and it is felt that it should be kept in its original state. Getting it up to commercial kitchen standard would greatly alter its character. Now the discussion is focused on the possibility of adding a new kitchen that could eventually be brought up to commercial standard to the south side of the hall. The existing kitchen could be converted to a meeting space and a library with comfortable seating for reading. The PPA has begun to look into what this would involve and cost and will keep the community informed about this proposed big change through a regular feature in Pitchfork. Meet the Neighbours—Heather McKenzie

17 year old Heather McKenzie lives on a farm in the Valley with her Mum Kerrie, Dad Mal and brother Connor. Born at Port Macquarie Base Hospital, she's a local girl through and through. Home schooled by her Mum, she says that this was "the best thing that ever happened to me - I wouldn't have wanted to go to school. Mum did a great job." There were no set lessons or content, her Mum coming up with the work she wanted them to do. She and her brother occasionally got together with other home school kids for outings and to do school work.

For his 14th birthday, Connor was given bagpipe lessons. Heather hated the sound (did he have to play out in the back paddock?) but then Connor taught her a few tunes and she was hooked. Taking lessons from Connor's teacher, Heather was soon competing in city competitions and playing in the local pipe band. In 2011 she won a scholarship to attend a 3-day workshop in Canberra, being taught by international musicians with 100 other young people from around the country.

Soon she took on the role of pipe major for the local pipe band, leading 8 pipers and 2 drummers of all ages. In January this year she added another scholarship to her credit, this time travelling



to Melbourne for a week-long workshop similar to the one she attended in Canberra. And now the award to travel to Scotland! For now Heather's goal for piping is to take the local band into competition. Heather's studying veterinary nursing at Tamworth TAFE by distance education and volunteering 2 days a week at the veterinary clinic in Wauchope. She'd always "sort of had in mind" to do veterinary work, then met the local vet at neighbour Dale Goldfinch's place one day and that cemented it for her. She wants to go on to do veterinary science once she finishes her vet nursing course. She's also studying horticulture. RFS Hollisdale and Pappinbarra - Can you make a Donation?

The current fire season has officials concerned about the higher than usual fuel loads in Pappinbarra and surrounding valleys. This is a result of the long time between hazard reduction burns due to the wet conditions we had. Already both Hollisdale and Pappinbarra brigades have been quite active in both our own and neighbouring valleys and summer is still to come. We've recently had to do a lot of night defences and these can be more dangerous than the day scenarios because of poor visibility in unfamiliar terrain. A number of us have had to deal with situations that we were fortunate to get out of unscathed. The risks could have been reduced by better visibility and availability breathing apparatus. It's not a nice feeling when you're lying on the ground with a hose in your hand in zero visibility and your next breath is going to be smoke! While your average suburban fire fighter has all the necessary equipment at his or her disposal, we as volunteers are limited to what we are supplied and the government in its wisdom has been cutting funding across the board. So it's really up to us in the local community to help those who are helping protect us from this very real threat. We are currently trying to raise money for helmet mounted torches and better breathing apparatuses for both the Hollisdale and Pappinbarra RFS vehicles. Any donation over \$2 is tax deductable and would be very much appreciated by the volunteers who may one day be defending your property. Days Gone By—In 1888, the Hon. James Young, member for Hastings and Manning in the Legislative Assembly from 1880-1894 travelled through his electorate and his movements were reported in instalments in the *Port Macquarie News* by *our Travelling Reporter*. After leaving Rollands Plains he travelled through Bellangry to reach our fair valley.

"After crossing Frazer's Creek, we came to the Pappinbarra Creek, both of which are tributaries of the Hastings River. We passed the residences of several settlers on the Pappinbarra, but the amount of agricultural land available appears to be very limited, and confined to a narrow belt along the bank of the creek, which is one of the best in the colony for water. Here,

too, we had testimony of the privations and hardships through which settlers pass in their struggles to make homes for themselves. Near the road stood what I took to be stack of posts, covered by a few sheets of bark; but our guide soon threw more light upon the matter, by informing me that this was the residence of a selector. The "house" consisted of an enclosure about 12ft. square, built of fencing posts, and these supported a flat roof of bark, just sufficiently high to admit of entrance. It was suggested by our honourable friend that the advantage of such a building would be found in its admissibility for firing a gun through what might be termed port holes in the event of such a necessity arising through invasion by enemies.









Pappinbarra Landholders Conservation Group — Pappinbarra Frog Study Group leaps into being

The PFSG (pronounced poofsoog) has sprung into being with a starting membership of 10 frog enthusiasts – an ideal number to begin the task of surveying frog populations in the Pappinbarra Valley. Our goal for the next year or two is to find out what species live in the valley, where they live, what habitats they use and what conditions they need to breed successfully. So we will be out on rainy evenings, looking, listening and learning – just as soon as it decides to rain again. Bandicoots—Bandicute?

Bandicoots can be right pests in the garden and it is impossible not to get irritated when they chose to dig for worms or grubs right in the middle of a freshly planted garden bed or patch of lawn. But every time we see bandicoot diggings or catch a glimpse of the culprit as it bounds away into cover, we can get a thrill to think that these peculiar marsupials are still with us in the Pappinbarra Valley.

In most other parts of Australia bandicoots vanished along with most of the native mammals in the 1920s to 30s, probably due mainly to clearing of bush and the spread of rabbits and foxes. Some species of bandicoots are now extinct while others are found only in reserves. But here in the Valley we have not just one but two

different kinds – long-noses (*Perameles nasuta*) and short-noses (*Isoodon macrourus*). Apart from the difference in nasal splendour they also differ in the texture of the fur – long-noses are softer furred while short-noses have stiffer fur due to the presence of thickened hairs called spines. Both kinds are nocturnal and omnivorous. They grub around for worms, beetle larvae and tasty tubers. Luckily they don't dig burrows but instead sleep during the day in a pile of leaves that they scratch together, often at the base of a tree or beside a log. Bandicoots live alone and courtship and mating is brief and probably unromantic ... although ... we have heard local bandicoots making a funny noise not unlike a kiss. This doesn't seem to be reported from other

places, so perhaps there is something about Pappinbarra Valley that encourages the romantic in all of its residents! After the romance comes the hard work of child-bearing and rearing. Not so hard for female bandicoots which have among the shortest pregnancies of any mammal — a mere 12 and half days. The tiny newborns weigh around 0.25 grams and make their own way to a pouch that opens backwards so that it doesn't fill up with soils when the mother is digging. Bandicoot milk is incredibly rich and by 7 weeks of age the young are booted out of the nest and off fending for themselves. Although females can start reproducing at only 5 months of age, many do not survive that long but instead become food for goannas, pythons, owls and foxes, and even the mighty Quoll that also still hunts in the Pappinbarra Valley. Port Maquarie Hastings Council - Natural Resource Management Update

Roadside Weed Control

Get ready to see control of invasive weeds along rural roads in your area. PMHC has secured \$48,000 to control invasive weeds in the Upper Camden Haven and Comboyne Plateau. To complement this effort, Council will be employing another invasive weed officer to provide a full time roadside weed control effort for all rural roads in the LGA. Where required, Council's Invasive Species Coordinator Grant Taylor will be contacting landholders to gain agreement and access to treat fence lines adjacent to road reserves. Over time the entire 20m wide road reserve will be treated and maintained for all invasive weeds, which will be a major benefit in the battle against weed invasion into farmland, rivers and bushlands.

Significant Roadside Vegetation and Habitat Trees

To complement vegetation mapping and roadside weed control,

Council has completed an audit of all significant habitat trees, koala food trees, remnant patches of Endangered Ecological Communities and rare and threatened plants within the rural road reserves in the LGA. This data will help Council avoid or mitigate impacts on this important vegetation whilst undertaking roadside maintenance works.

Ecohealth - a check of the health of our waterways

partnership with the Northern Rivers Catchment Management Authority, University of New England and University of New South Wales, Council will be completing a 12month comprehensive health check of our waterways including the major freshwater and estuarine water bodies in the LGA. Report cards for each catchment will be available at the end of the year.

In the Vegie Patch this Month

This is the optimum time to plant all the vine/runner vegies rockmelon, watermelon, honeydew and pumpkins. Why not try growing Rosella or Pepino? They love hot summers. Keep your vegie patch cool and moist by applying mulches, such as sugarcane or pea straw. Adding water crystals to the planting hole will aid the establishment of your crop.

Rosella (Hibiscus sabdariffa) – an attractive annual shrub to 1.5 m high with large, lobed reddish leaves and attractive yellow hibiscus-like flowers; the fleshy calyx is used in salads, jellies, cranberry-like sauces, jam and cordial, syrups and wine; dried red calyx is used for tea and is an important ingredient in the commercial Red Zinger, Hibiscus and Fruit teas; the tea is very similar in flavour to rose-hips and high in vitamin С. http:// greenharvest.com.au/SeedOrganic/


