

## Times Past & Present

#### With Rosalie June Fowler (née Hollis)

J une, who was born in June and has always been called June, thinks her mother ran out of original names! The youngest of Dan and Vida Hollis' seven children, born in Wauchope in 1932, she grew up on a property called *Hollisdale*. Located along Shaws Road, and now owned by Andreas Carboni, it has been re-named several times.

Hollisdale was a dairy farm; the family milked 40 cows twice a day. All the children had chores to do before and after school. June started milking (by hand) and separating cream when she was only five years old. Nine years later her dad modernized and bought a petrol generator! The house was very basic with hessian ceilings and no electricity.

June started at Ellengrove School six months before she turned five. Four of the Hollis children were at school at the same time. There was one teacher with 14 students ranging in age from four to fifteen. June's first teacher was Lyle Cameron, who stayed at the school for two years and boarded with Pat Murray's grandparents.

Her next teacher was John Yabsley, also boarding with Pat's grandparents. Stella, Pat's mum, was at school with June and was the eldest. The kids thought Mr Yabsley was inspired; he had special days and Christmas parties and when it was cold the children were sent out to collect firewood and they would light up and do their school work on benches in front of the roaring fire. Not one wore shoes; these were reserved for church or visits to the doctor.

In 1941 John Yabsley went off to war. The school closed (temporarily); June, aged nine, and her sister had to walk about five miles to Lyddington School down near the Pappinbarra bridge - no mean feat in bare feet! There Mrs Pat Roach taught about 20 students. Mrs Jo Roach, Julie-Anne Murphy's mother, taught sewing, so the education was well rounded. June was schooled at home for a while when she was nearly 11 and all schoolwork was done by correspondence until the Ellengrove School re-opened using unqualified subsidised teachers.

June's father fell ill when she was 15, so she and her brother had to run the farm, milk the cows, feed the chooks and pigs and help their mother in the house. Life was hard but simple and the family thought they were made when 'Dad bought an old Buick and we could go to dances in style'! Until then, in ball gowns sewn by hand and beautifully coiffured hair, the girls jumped on



the back of the cream truck dressed in their finery and were blown to smithereens on the drive to the fortnightly dance at Beechwood Hall.

In 1951 everyone was invited to *Clover Hills* for a 'tin kettling' - welcoming home newlyweds by vigorously banging kerosene tins with sticks. What a party! June met her future husband, Pat Fowler. They married the next year at St Joseph's in Wauchope, took over Pat's family dairy farm on Rawdon Island, raised a son and two daughters and lived there until Pat sadly died of cancer in 1996. The farm used to flood regularly and they would end up with 70 cows crowded together on half an acre of land. Pat had to find work off-farm, so June managed and worked the dairy almost unaided for 20 years.

After the farm was sold in 1956, June moved to Clareville Avenue in Wauchope. She was secretary of the Pink Ladies and worked at the hospital and Bundaleer, but gave it up about ten years ago as she was getting a bit old and wanted to travel - which she does as often as possible. Her time is filled with looking after her lovely garden, doing jigsaw puzzles, working at the Legacy op-shop, selling raffle tickets and Legacy badges and going to the RSL twice a week for a meal and the meat raffle.

June loves to go out and socialize; she came to the recent Bush Dance at Hollisdale Hall and was impressed with her old school room and the hall in general. Good on you June - come and visit us and your old school any time! June has a mind and memory as sharp as a tack - not bad for a woman who left school at the tender age of 15, lives alone with minimal help, has an artificial knee and shoulder and a pacemaker!

#### Bird of the Month

Red-browed Finch Neochmia temporalis

T he red-browed finch is small (11 to 12 cm) but boldly marked so is hard to overlook as it feeds or bathes close by our homes.

A bright red bill and eyebrow together with a bright red rump adorn an otherwise dull coloured body. The back and wings are olive-green and the under-body is grey, while the tail is black. Young birds have black bills and do not have the red eyebrow. Both sexes are alike.

Red-browed finches are found in the eastern part of Australia from Cape York in Queensland, southward to Adelaide in South Australia. They inhabit grassy clearings in forests with dense understory growth and are often found along creek lines.

In small feeding flocks ranging up to 10-20 birds, they are sedentary or nomadic within their locality, searching for suitable seeding grasses. They feed mostly on the ground on seeds and insects, but seek nearby dense shrubbery at the slightest hint of danger. Seed feeders and bird baths attract

them. Calls are almost inaudible high-pitched squeaks and chirps.

Breeding takes place between September and January in the south of the



finch's range. During this time a male may court the female by holding a stem of grass in his bill and displaying before her. Using both green and dry grass stems, together they construct a loose, bulky, bottle-shaped nest with a side entrance in a dense bush or tree from 1-3 meters above ground. The nest chamber is lined with small feathers and other soft material. Clutch size is 4-6 eggs with often more than one clutch per season. All nesting duties are shared by both parents.

T oday marks the conclusion of another action-packed year for PPA. Your committee has worked hard, not only to maintain and improve Hollisdale Hall for all the activities happening there, but also to build a sense of community in our Pappinbarra Valley and the surrounding area. So what has PPA achieved during the past twelve months?

Many PPA activities aim to promote community spirit and raise funds for maintenance and improvement of our community-owned Hollisdale Hall.

We have organised a **First Friday barbecue** at the hall every month except January, so that people of the valley, their visitors and those from further afield have the opportunity to meet, talk and eat together in a relaxed setting. Of course this involves a lot of work. I want to thank everyone who has helped make these evenings so successful, especially the members who willingly stepped up to the barbecue plate to feed the crowd. Your Vice President Mary Walker, purchased the food for FF, organised chairs and tables and the members' draw and raffle. Treasurer Sue Frost kept the change flowing and looked after food money and memberships. Rubbish removal was dealt with by myself and Mary Walker; toilets cleaned by Kelly Gould and Liz Gough; grounds kept looking great by Bryan Gough. People who came early helped set up and many helped with the clean-up. Thank you all for your help - it couldn't have been done without you.

Pappinbarra Players' 2015 production of Ray Cooney's comedy *Move over Mrs Markham* was performed in Beechwood Hall in September to four very appreciative audiences! Our reviewer said: "It was a riot of uproarious sexual shenanigans, with John Uncle's direction making the most of the opportunity to celebrate funny business in every sense"!

In September, a beautiful spring day saw the 2015 **Greg Ostler Memorial Cricket Match** at the Upper Pappinbarra Recreation Ground. Thanks to Steve Ostler, barbecue cooks Jim McGahey, Angela Frost and Ken Aplin, umpires Scott Lindsay, Pete Davison, scorekeeper Chris Roelandts and all who participated or observed, the day was a great success. The Hastings Co-op kindly donated a fruit and vegetable hamper to raffle. The profits for the day were split between the Pappinbarra and Hollisdale RFBs.

We had a pleasant **consultation with Council** at the hall in October; we thank them for coming and listening to the community's concerns.

Our **Grown and Gathered Market was** kicked off by Natalie Mrowka and helpers on the first Sunday in November. It is evolving every month with our social media guru Heather Smith at the forefront of the growth. We feel that these markets are good for our community and hope they continue for the foreseeable future.

**PPA's Christmas party** on December First Friday was enjoyed by all the kids as Santa arrived on the fire truck, siren sounding, driven by Captain Chris Roelandts. Jeannette Rainbow helped him distribute presents from his sack. Folk brought desserts to share and a festive time was had by all. Thanks to everyone involved.

We thank **Port Macquarie Hastings Council** for their great support in our endeavours to improve our hall and its facilities. Under their grants program, we received \$6394 for resources to paint the hall inside and out and have the floor professionally sanded and sealed. Volunteers have so far spent about 800 hours in preparation and painting. Darren Rowley brought along his cherry picker to help with the high walls at the back. Liz Gough provided morning teas and lunches for the volunteers. Thanks to all who put in the hard work to bring our lovely hall to the picturesque state it's in today.

Council also gave us \$500 towards Christine Nolan's community garden initiative. This has been used to kick off the permaculture project with construction of a new garden bed in front of the Ellengrove schoolroom and a new garden coming soon to the rear of the block.

PPA's beautiful **2016 Pappinbarra Valley calendars** were sold at December's FF. Thanks to organiser Sharada Boyce, Angela Frost for layout, those who contributed photos and Sue Frost for marketing. We are grateful for the advertising support from local businesses.

March's **Beekeeping Workshop** (with theory and practical sessions on two Saturdays), delivered by Patrick McEntee, Mark Hickson and Jean Hegarty had ten keen participants, many of whom now have their own bees. Trish Crick was so inspired she has constructed a fabulous permaculture bee garden on her lofty hillside. Those who bought flow hives said they really valued the contact with experienced beekeepers.

PPA's Indian Cooking class of eight students and Indian Night at the hall in April was a great success. Alicia Gestal-Lanza, Harold Stokes and George Hegarty shared their expertise and sixty diners that evening enjoyed a delicious Indian feast. PPA was thrilled to welcome the Jewelled Gypsies for a repeat performance and many joined in an impromptu belly dancing class!

We have been fortunate in receiving funds from the Commonwealth Department of Social Services Volunteer Grants for a brushcutter, pressure washer and vacuum cleaner and from the Holiday Coast Credit Union Community Partnership Grants for almost \$2990 towards the cost of solar panels for the hall.

**Trivia Night** was again May's standout event, adding to PPA coffers while everyone ate, drank, racked their brains and made a racket! Peter Michael and Chay Khamsone devised and delivered the questions, kept the scores and tried to control the crowd. Mary Walker organised everything and everyone else in her usual capable way, including persuading many local businesses to donate the terrific prizes. Many thanks to all involved.

Thanks to them, to Sue Frost's decorating team and all who served food, and cleaned up before and after. I locked up at midnight after seeing off over 100 attendees home.

PPA's **Say NO to Plastic** project, co-ordinated by Sue Frost and backed by a seeding grant from **Hastings Co-op**, sold 50 reusable shopping bags, made by members, at the July Grown and Gathered Market. This project is a fantastic way of getting the message to people of the valley and the wider community about saving our environment.

We continued publication of PPA's newsletter, *Pitchfork*. Angela Frost does a fantastic job of design and layout, Jan Childs capably looks after printing and folding, Liz Gough advertising and Jean Hegarty editing. Regular contributions from Peter Fackender, Mary Walker, Chris Roelandts, Jean Hegarty and myself have been supplemented from time to time by Chay Khamsone, Sue Frost, Kelly Miller, Mark Hickson, Cathy Eggert, Patrick McEntee, Ken Aplin, Bryony Anderson, Adrian Guthrie, Christine Nolan, Bev Sibthorpe, Steve Ostler, Peter Michael, Mary Wagg, Natalie Mrowka, Morrow Taplin, Todd Barnes, Heather Smith, Jennie Lea and Alison and Brendan of Greenbourne Nursery. Pappinbarra people are involved in many community-based enterprises in Wauchope, so we do give back to the great town that gives us such a lot of support. Please support those who support us whenever you have the chance.

We are lucky enough to be getting some much-needed work done (by Council) on the surface of the **Pappinbarra tennis court**. This will ensure that we are able to keep playing there for years to come. The ground is Council-owned and forms a vital link to the community that sits on the dirt end of the road.

I would also like to acknowledge the people that have previously volunteered to get the hall where it is today - thank you - without you our job would have been that much harder.

For those who will one day volunteer their time I encourage you in this endeavour as it is a most rewarding experience and one that will bring you a deep sense of satisfaction. Don't be fooled: it can be hard work, unappreciated by some and downright frustrating at times. It's not for the faint hearted on occasions. But ultimately it's for the good of the community. You don't always have to be available but when you are giving 100% that means the team effort works brilliantly. In this role I have made some lovely friends that will be with me for life and I can't express how happy that makes me feel.

At the conclusion of my first year as president, I want to express my thanks to the truly wonderful committed committee who have worked like a well-oiled machine and to all those who have been such enthusiastic supporters of PPA in its various endeavours. it in their beaut fire shed! This is a vehicle that is smaller than the usual fire truck, so can get places the bigger one has difficulty in accessing.




