What a difference a day makes

On Thursday 9 February a fire started on Ocean Valley Road. With the help of a dozer and more than 50 RFB trucks over the next three days, it was contained.

Because of fires all over the state, on Saturday morning a 'Section 44' - a state of emergency - was declared. Helicopters, fixed wing aircraft and the large air water tanker were on standby. With bad weather predicted on Sunday with westerly winds and high temperatures, there was great

concern that the Ocean Valley Road fire would jump its containment lines and make a run towards Beechwood.



RFS headquarters had strike teams from as far away as Sydney and the far north coast. RFS, Forestry and Fire and Rescue teams were on standby close to our area.

When a fire started near 1087 Pappinbarra Road on Sunday afternoon, the westerly winds moved it with lightning speed. Nearly 1200 hectares were burnt out and several houses lost. But for the dedicated work of all agencies, and the fact that they responded very quickly, the catastrophe would have been much greater.

just down Pappinbarra Road. Helen's fence was cut to allow her six endurance horses to flee. She and her son, who had been sheltering inside, away from the day's extreme heat, fled the fire by car. They managed to escape down the narrow drive in an easterly direction. Had the drive headed west from the

house to Pappinbarra Road, their exit would have been problematic. The lovely old timber house succumbed to the approaching inferno.


Helen's horses, confused by smoke, fire and swirling winds, suffered burns and one had to be put down a couple of days later. The condition of another is cause for concern. There has been a fantastic response to the funding campaign to assist Helen; the horses were burnt and require ongoing treatment. Offers of agistment for horses and other animals affected by the fires from many in the wider community are being actioned by PPA. At the time of printing, details are yet to be finalised, but it is certain that Helen, her son and horses will be cared for by their Pappinbarra friends and generous folk from the wider community.

Saving two properties: a case study

In September of last year, Pappinbarra and Hollisdale Rural Fire Brigades hosted a community bushfire safety meeting at Hollisdale Hall. Attendees were urged to complete a fire survival plan and to lodge a copy with the RFS. Such action means that response teams can go into properties aware of the access, space to turn vehicles and availability of water for recharge. Many of us left the hall resolving to act on the recommendations [and many of us haven't done it yet and have

just had a huge wake-up call.] The meeting sowed at least one seed: Trevor Smith and his neighbours, Greg and Cathy Johnston, got together and the three planned what would do if threatened. As well, Greg and started their Cathy year. training this The Johnstons' place is a wildlife refuge,

undergrowth is important for survival of small birds. Trevor makes nest boxes and other objects from wood and has stores of timber close to his small house. He keeps the surrounding area clear and green as far as possible.

Trevor is at pains to point out that he was part of a team - he, Greg, Cathy, their son Nathan and the firies who turned up to lend a hand. He emphasises that they had water available to fight the fire and managed it because the location in relation to the fire gave them time to carry out their plan. With a different scenario they may have been obliged to evacuate. He also said they were fortunate in having a petrol pump; people with electric pumps were stuffed when the power went off unless they had a generator at hand.

Tanks above Trevor's are kept full using a petrol-powered pump from the river. Greg and Trevor had put a standpipe into the line with a fire hose which Trevor manned and Greg had another tank down at his place with a standpipe hooked onto a fire-fighting hose. Nathan and Cathy had joined lengths of garden hose hooked into the pressurised line so they could throw water some distance down in the area along the river inaccessible to vehicles. Trevor wet everything down at the top and the others were down at the bottom with a sprinkler. When a spot fire started up between Greg's house and the river and went up into the canopy, they all moved down there to deal with it. Mark from next door came to help. At this stage the



fire front wasn't even in sight; Paul Pollet could see spot fires starting up well ahead of the front from his high vantage point at *Inshallah*.

Trevor had been wetting down around his place before the fire reached them, and it burnt up to where he had doused the ground. The heat browned off all leaves

although the flames didn't reach the canopy. He had put on a sprinkler to the west of his stored timber about mid-day, an hour before the fire started. The front went past on the upper side of Pappinbarra Road well before it came down their side. They ensured that the (plastic) tanks were full and hosed down. A 6hp pump was at the river with hose and fittings already in situ. The Bonny Hills fire truck arrived as the front approached on the second side. When the firies realised the party had unlimited water at their disposal they hosed round the top and filled up twice from the tanks. *Storz* valves had been fitted to all the tanks as per plan. Greg used half his big tank - 50,000 litres of water. The rest of the water - a huge volume - came out of the river.

Even after the rain since Black Sunday, Trevor found 'a huge log burning like a bloody furnace' the following Saturday afternoon when he went for a walk up the river. It took forty buckets of water to put it out. Then he had to deal with another flare-up. He says they were very lucky that the fire didn't come down both sides of Pappinbarra Road at the same time - the task would have been much bigger. When we spoke the next day, he and Greg had been busy installing a 9hp pump instead of the 6hp one used to save the place. "It was a learning experience all right!" "A real baptism of fire," added Cathy.

The Rural Fire Service and the Pappinbarra fires

RFS Wauchope put out a newsletter to notify Pappinbarra residents of a community disaster response meeting to be held at Hollisdale Hall at 7 pm on Thursday 16 February. A barbecue before the meeting was run by volunteers from Beechwood P&C. Thanks to all who helped and/or donated food and drinks. The response came from everywhere and was really appreciated. PPA organised gathering information from affected so that, in cooperation with the agencies, we could coordinate and target the response, directing all offers of help to those in need.

At the meeting, Superintendent Kam Baker told us that there was an unprecedented lead-up to the fire situation, especially for the mid north coast. "Never before had there been such

forest fuel dryness and a significant lightning event the previous weekend had started 20 fires of which seven or so were still cause for concern the next weekend, [Pappinbarra's Black Weekend 11-12 February 2017]. On the evening of Wednesday 8 February the prospect was potentially catastrophic fire weather to an extent never before seen here. The Saturday afternoon to Sunday forecast was very significant and concerning - 43°C, low humidity and gusty winds. In these conditions there was absolutely no chance of controlling fire once it took hold."

According to Kam, "The Weather Bureau got it right: the catastrophic conditions did eventuate.

"Significant planning by all agencies started on the Wednesday Local Land Services, Forestry, National Parks, RFS. It was a cooperative effort with myself designated in charge. Strike teams were pre-positioned with an inter-agency management team based at Wauchope. On Saturday morning the team was in place and warnings were sent out. [Local RFBs had been asked on Thursday to ascertain readiness of their volunteers and to be ready.] Plenty of people heeded the warnings and evacuated.

"The primary objective was to protect lives and warn the community. At 1300 hours on Sunday a fire was reported and



primary response crews were diverted from Ocean Valley Road. Twelve minutes later they were on the scene; 5-10 hectares were alight and blazing.

"The fire is now [Thursday 16 February] contained. Without all agencies working together we couldn't have done it. Forestry expertise was instrumental. The burnt area is 1234 hectares with a 28 k perimeter. 700 ha were burnt in the first hour. The response was super-human. We had strike teams staged up and pre-positioned to supplement local resources. 'Just keep sending trucks till we say stop.'

"Fire conditions were catastrophic. Pappinbarra Road is one way in, same way out. With tankers and response vehicles coming in we didn't want people on the road going out.

"Six homes were lost and fourteen sheds. Forty-five houses survived, three with some sort of damage. Losses were significantly limited by preparations and people defending their property. You could tell which people had a bushfire survival plan."

Kam was blown away by stories of people who heeded warnings and left before there was a fire. He had nothing but utmost admiration for all the team and the firefighters.

From Letitia Fitzpatrick on the Wauchope Gazette:

Weary Pappinbarra people met at Hollisdale hall last night (Thursday 16 February) to thank the firefighters who saved 45 homes from destruction in the devastating bushfires. They shared their experiences of the catastrophic blazes, and talked to agencies that could help them.

Lisa McLeod, president of the Pappinbarra Progress Association, said the meeting, which began with a barbecue, went very well.

"It was very positive. A lot of stories were shared; a lot of people reconnected with people they hadn't seen for a while," she said.

228 people attended, with a multitude of agencies ready to help. They included the RFS; Police; PMHC; DPI; Forestcorp; LLS; Human Services; North Coast Health, Family and Community Services and Lifeline.

The Association has a big weekend ahead, collecting everyone's data.

"We have deliveries of fodder coming up the road and by late Sunday, we hope to match everyone up with the services they need - food, fodder, fences, equipment," said Lisa. "The community response is phenomenal. There are high emotions running, and some exhausted people in the valley offering their services. People are really tired, and we are regrouping.

"The RFS were in position the Wednesday before, getting ready, because they knew something was going to happen, and that's why the impact was lessened, so we lost six dwellings rather than 45.

"Our community is growing in tightness and people will make life-long friends," added Lisa.

More from Lisa: "It's at times like this that we come together and open our hearts to all our community members. Everyone still needs to be really vigilant and look after each other."

"Good old Hollisdale Hall is a community lifeline. And such is the case in Pappinbarra right now [Monday after the fires]. There's a barbecue tonight; the hall's open all day and support services are available."

PPA received a grant of \$3500 last year from Australia Post to 'ready our hall for refuge'. The work will commence shortly. We've also applied for a grant to upgrade kitchen facilities to enhance the community's capacity to cope with disasters.

A message from Hastings Co-op

Hastings Co-op Chief Executive Allan Gordon: "Our thoughts and prayers are with all those affected by the devastating fires, including the brave men and women working tirelessly to keep our community safe.

"It's hard to know what we can do to help, but now is the time to rally together and Hastings Co-op will do all we can.

"Over the coming days, we will be talking with emergency services and related authorities to determine the best way to assist affected families, whether that be in the form of groceries, clothing, bedding, stock feed or farm supplies.

"It has been heart-warming to witness the swell of community spirit this weekend. We are so proud to be part of the Hastings community and will be standing right beside you in the tough times."

Essential Energy

On the Monday after the fire 274 customers were without power west of Wauchope, primarily in the Pappinbarra area. Essential Energy received clearance from the RFS that morning to access the fire affected areas to commence line patrols. Crews promptly started some repairs with more than 20 power poles (and associated infrastructure) destroyed and requiring replacement.

Extra crews from Taree assisted local teams. Essential Energy text messaged all affected customers and provided updates via social media.

Pythonwood bee garden survived despite assaults from both directions and a last furious attack when the southerly arrived. Trish fought the final battle by herself with a mattock to




