Meet the Neighbours- - Joyce Marie Ditchburn

Joyce was born on her grandfather's dairy farm in Hallam, Victoria. She was delivered on the dining room table!! (breakfast had been cleared away) By the age of 3 she could milk a cow and she helped her grandfather in the dairy until his death when she was 7 years old. She went to the local school until she was 15 years old.

Joyce worked as a stocking seamer from the age of 15 to 21 and she seamed thousands of stockings until she married and moved to a dairy farm in Bena, Victoria, with her mother and first husband. Dairying was definitely in her blood and every day she milked her own herd of 45 cows and a neighbouring herd of 250 cows. She also raised 3 boys and rode track work for a local horse trainer in her spare time!!

In 1979, newly divorced, Joyce went to a New Year's Eve party and met Arthur and was swept off her feet. Arthur needed a companion to join him on a cruise; it took 3 weeks and many expensive dinners to convince Joyce that a cruise with Arthur was a good idea. They had a wonderful time and the rest is history.

Joyce and Arthur lived in Sydney until 1989 when Arthur retired and they moved to Pappinbarra. Arthur was not really interested in farming, so Joyce was the boss and she set up a Charolais stud. They travelled a lot during this time, both within Australia and overseas and generally lived the good life. Arthur died in 2003 and Joyce continued farming with the help of her son, Allan, and her good and generous neighbours.

Allan lived on the farm with Joyce for 18 months and became Vice President of the PPA. He has now gone to Chinderah where the work is more plentiful, but is keen to return here.

Many of you will remember the desserts that Joyce prepared for Dimboola single-handedly.

She is always willing to pitch in and help whenever asked, a good friend indeed.

Joyce still moves fences for her cows every day. She is getting slower and can no longer wrestle a recalcitrant calf to the ground. She talks to her cows and is convinced that they understand - they haven't answered her back yet but it won't be long until they do!!!

Pappinbarra Progress Association and Hollisdale Hall – We need you!

The PPA goes back a long way and was already in existence when it acquired the old Ellengrove School building and surrounding land from the Education Department around 1958. We became an incorporated body in 1993 and own the Hollisdale Hall, one of only a handful of local communities which own their hall (the others are Byabarra, Ellenborough, Kindee, Kendall Community Centre and Rollands Plains). With hall ownership come some great opportunities as well as important responsibilities.

A lot of work has gone into making the Hollisdale Hall what it is today. The re-piering of the original school building (the kitchen) and building the extension were both done many years ago with voluntary labour. More recently, the large undercover area, small gazebos, exterior toilets, interior and exterior painting, paths, new roof, hall ceiling and attached shed/toilet were all made possible by grants to the Association from various sources. Improvements to the kitchen were partly funded through grants and partly through donations. Hats off to previous committees for all their hard work.

The Hall is a really great venue for community events and a precious asset that helps foster a sense of community in the Valley. To take care of it we have to pay for maintenance, utilities, property and public liability insurance (big ticket items!) and equipment. We also have plans and hopes for further work including a fence along the front, a much larger storage shed out the back, further upgrading of the kitchen, and a climbing structure for the kids.

We have a committee that works hard to look after the Hall,

make it accessible to people, pay the bills, keep making improvements and produce a newsletter. We raise funds through our First Friday Family Night BBQ and raffle, other raffles (e.g. the Money Tree and Jan's painting), a program of events throughout the year (e.g. Dimboola, which was an outstanding success, the Bush Dance, Trivia Night) and through applying for grants whenever and wherever we can. *Pitchfork*, which is our key communication mechanism with people in the Valley costs a bit to print, but we are working hard to get that to the point where it covers its own costs.

Membership of the Association is also really important – not only does it raise a little money for the Hall, it also allows us to show the scale of support we have from the local community when we apply for grants. We currently have 67 financial members, which is great, but we're always keen for more.

Now for the pitch! If you're not already a member, think about joining the Association and doing your bit to help keep the Hollisdale Hall 'alive' (currently \$5 per adult, children free). Come along to First Friday Family Night and our other events (we have an amazingly wide range of interesting people from all walks of life living in this Valley) – members and non-members all welcome. You can also help with working bees and maybe donate something to the Hall – you'll see in this issue of *Pitchfork* that were currently on the lookout for a piano.

We look forward to seeing some new faces amongst our regulars in the coming months.

Pappinbarra History Project

Pioneer Days in Pappinbarra by Eva Everett, Hastings Shire Gazette 18/6/1987; Extract

'We lived in Pappinbarra for about 7 years before acquiring the luxury of a Model T Ford car in 1930. Outings were few and far between and before owning the car, consisted of trips to friends and neighbours in the sulky drawn by our bay pony Kitty. These were very special occasions and greatly enjoyed by the children.

'In the early days, when the weather was wet, nothing was transported beyond the "missing link", a slippery hill on the property of Mr Lewis snr. Later a better road enabled supplies to be brought to Pappinbarra Junction by cream lorry and each resident collected his groceries by horseback, horse and cart etc.

'My sister Rosa sometimes walked the three miles to the Junction to collect the mail which came three times a week. Later, Milton and Lil also made this trek. I well remember in flood time once our family lived on boiled wheat for days.

'For six years we ran a dairy as well as the sawmill; the cream (in cans) being taken across the creek in flood times by a 'flying fox' – a strong wire stretched across the creek above water level and fastened each end to the trees. At other times carted to Wauchope Butter Factory by cream lorry, which for many years

came only as far as the Junction. Mr Walter Schmitzer was the driver for most of our childhood days.

'We never went to town before owning the car, unless to the dentist, and then it would be by the cream lorry. My brother Milton's first trip to Wauchope was at about age 9. There were only three or four shops in the main street at that time.

'Sometimes dad employed men with bullock teams to draw the logs to his saw mill. Norm Mackay, Mr Cameron, and Bill Stanley all worked for dad. We children were fascinated watching the obedience of the bullocks to their owners.

'Even after acquiring the car, trips to town were rare and we had to take turns as room had to be provided for 150 lb bag of flour, wheat, tins of kerosene (for lamps), groceries etc.

'One of the terrors of my childhood was our Model T being stuck in the Junction Creek. To me it seemed to almost always happen. Dad and my brother Ivan would take off their shoes, roll up their trousers, dry the vitals of the old car, bag the radiator and usually, away she would go. But every time we drove through I would hold my breath.

'It was an exciting luxury when the bridge was built over the Junction creek'.

Foodie's Corner - Easy Pavlova

2 egg whites, 1 1/2 cups castor sugar, 1/2 tsp vanilla, 1 tsp vinegar, 1 tsp corn flour, 4 tablespoons boiling water.

Beat all ingredients together until very stiff, spread on greased tray.

Bake for 10 mins in mod oven, reduce heat to low and bake a further 45 mins, cool in oven.

Bird of the Month - Satin Bowerbird

Common name: Satin Bowerbird

Scientific name: *Ptilonorhynchus violaceus*

Size: 27 – 33 cm.

Status: Secure

The male Satin Bowerbird has a deep black plumage which has a deep blue sheen. Its bill is a pale yellowish as are the legs. Females have grey-green plumage above with grey-brown wings and tail while below they are green/yellow with dark scalloped markings. The bill is dark. Both adult birds have a blue eyes. Juvenile males are coloured like females. Juvenile males can begin the transition to adult plumage about their 4th year but don't achieve full male plumage till their 7th year.

Their voice consists of strong whistles, hissing and buzzing sounds intermixed at times with mimicry. The male also gives a "weeoo" call.

Satin Bowerbirds inhabit rainforest, woodland and parks and gardens along the east coast of Australia where they feed mainly on fruits. They occur as small flocks during autumn/winter when they can do damage to fruit orchards.

During the breeding season the adult males defend a territory against other males. In this territory he constructs a Bower of small sticks for display and courting. The Bower consists of two parallel walls of sticks oriented north/south and placed toward the rear of a cleared area. This display area is decorated with items of a blue colour along with brown snail shells, cicada nymph shells and yellow flowers and leaves. The male performs complex "dances" at the bower to attract females where he mates with any receptive female at or near the bower.

Breeding occurs from September to February with the female laying two to three eggs in a nest she constructs herself. She incubates and raises the young without any assistance from the male bird.

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Plant Profile—Annual Ragweed

In what seems like no time at all, Annual Ragweed has gone from 'zero' (ie lying in the soil seed bank) to 2 metre-tall flowering giants everywhere I look. It's particularly aggressive in areas that have been scarified (laid bare) by significant disturbance events such as grading and stock-piling, overgrazing followed by de-stocking and in areas affected by flood-waters.

Annual Ragweed is a member of the daisy family Asteraceae, but unlike many in the family that produce seeds with a pappus of 'parachute'-like 'hairs' for drifting on the wind (think of Croftonweed, Groundsel bush, Fleabane etc), Annual Ragweed

simply produces thousands of tiny seeds that usually just fall beneath the parent plant. Hence, a single plant last year can easily give rise to a hundred plants on the same spot this year. The plant is an annual and effective management needs to be integrated (eg stocking pressure prior to seed set, herbicide application, pasture competition) and planned. Annual Ragweed is an acute trigger of hay fever from its wind-blown pollen and occasionally causes contact skin reactions in people.

Common name: Annual Ragweed **Botanical name:** *Ambrosia artemisiifolia* **FAMILY:** Asteraceae **Native range:** America.

Description: Fast growing annual herb to 2m with finely divided leaves. Crushed leaves have a strong smell. Flowers appear at/



near the top of the plant. **Ecology:** Another disturbance specialist, it quickly colonises ground with poor coverage or in inter-tussock spaces in pasture. Abundant tiny seeds that spread in water, and on machinery, tools, people and livestock.

Pappinbarra Rural Fire Brigade News: Grass fires – a growing threat

A recent news article from NSW RFS Fire Commissioner Shane Fitzsimmons has highlighted the increased risk state-wide of grass fires. We quote his comments: "Grass fires pose a real danger. They can start easily & spread quickly. It's not unusual for grass fires to burn at 20 or 30 kph under certain conditions and they can quickly destroy homes, crops & livelihoods. This poses a real issue as many people haven't seen conditions like this in a generation. They need to understand the risk and prepare for it" the Commissioner said.

Be prepared:

- Keep well maintained firebreaks mowed, ploughed, slashed or grazed along fence lines or around your home, shed and storage areas. This can slow the spread of a fire.
- Keep a well maintained area around your home, such as lawns, paths or gardens.
- Keep the grass cut.
- Seal under-floor spaces to stop embers entering under your house.
- Make sure you've got water for fire-fighting, have water tanks filled and connected to a pump.
- Have a diesel pump. Electric pumps won't work during a fire if the power goes out.
- Store things like fuel & wood piles well away from your house.
- Make sure the access points to your property will enable a fire truck to enter. Cattle grids & bridges will need to support the weight of a fire truck.
